

Why is "Communities for a Lifetime" initiative important?

Florida demographics are changing. In 2000, realizing the challenges ahead in meeting the needs of a rapidly growing and aging population, the Department of Elder Affairs began the **Elder Ready**

Communities and Elder Ready

Businesses initiative. By early 2002, over 50 cities had committed to the first phase of the initiative. In recognizing that elder friendly enhancement benefits people of all ages, Governor Bush launched the initiative's second phase, "Communities for a Lifetime." This phase focuses on coordinating with other state agencies as well as local organizations to broaden the scope of the initiative.

- Historically, Florida attracts more than 50,000 new retirees yearly.
- Presently 3.5 million, or 23% of Floridans, are age 60 or older.
- From 1990 to 2000, Florida's population grew 23.5% compared to the 13.1% national average.
- Florida has a higher percentage of seniors than any other state.



Elders own 70 percent of the financial assets in the U.S., pay \$1.4 billion in taxes and are one of Florida's greatest assets.

The baby boomer generation begins turning 65 in 2010.

What exactly does the "Communities for a Lifetime" initiative do?

"Communities for a Lifetime" provides statewide coordination, technical assistance and related services to Florida cities, towns and counties that wish to participate in the voluntary initiative. A Community Report Card for Well and Frail Elders is provided as an assessment tool and guideline to follow.

What should be evaluated?

Physical (remove barriers/promote mobility)

- Accessibility (ADA standards)
- Housing universal design products and environments to be usable by all people
- Types of housing to accommodate stages of living

Transportation

- Accessibility convenient and affordable to goods and services
- Energy-efficient mass transit
- Traffic signal timing/crosswalks for pedestrian safety
- Larger, easier to read signs

Land Use (effective community planning & design)

- Parks, trails, waterways, greenways facilitating easy access to businesses and services
- Walkable communities with improved sidewalk accessibility, better lighting and neighborhood watch

Community Development

- Business Partnerships public/private
- Friendly Businesses accommodate special needs
- Employment ample, meaningful opportunities for all ages
- Volunteerism wide variety of services

Physical/Mental - access to quality services;
