The Clearwater Parks System

Clearwater residents have enjoyed a high quality of life partly because of their commitment to fund and support the City's parks and recreation system. The City's park and recreation system consisting of miles of beautiful beach and waterfront, state of the art community centers, dozens of neighborhood parks, lush nature reserves and connecting trails - are generally well used and received by the citizens. However, the Master Plan has identified the need to redevelop and renovate several of the existing park sites and facilities over the next 20 years.

Clearwater as Facilitator

To accomplish this objective, the City's Parks and Recreation Department has adopted a philosophy as "facilitators" of parks and recreation to residents, visitors and residents of unincorporated Pinellas County. The "facilitator" model basically states that the City is not the only responsible party in providing services to residents - but instead, a leader in helping to deliver City services in conjunction with other providers such as non-profit groups, municipal organizations, the County, and the School Board. This cooperation is essential in meeting the array of various parks and recreation needs and priorities.

The Implementation Program

The implementation program for meeting resident's recreation needs and priorities identified in the Master Plan is categorized by the following prioritization schedule:


- Priority Actions 2003 to 2008
- Medium Term Actions 2009 to 2014
- Long Term Actions 2015 to 2022
- Continuous Actions / Policies ongoing

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The Implementation Philosophy in Action

In order to create a sustainable parks and recreation system, the City as well as its partners must share in providing the fiscal resources needed to implement the plan.

The following chart summarizes the various recommended capital funding sources and amounts:

Bond Issue	\$31,178,000
Pinellas County	\$9,800,000
Penny II	\$12,700,000
Penny III	\$16,938,000
Impact Fees	\$1,725,000
Grants	\$16,533,000
Total Funds Required	\$88,874,000

If the entire plan representing \$88.8 million is constructed, it will require additional annual maintenance costs of approximately \$4.5 million. Two thirds of this cost will be met with participation from the County, user fees and new revenue sources. Further study is needed to determine how to cover the remaining costs of \$1.5 million.

A Call for Participation

To make this vision a reality, everyone must be an active participant, including Pinellas County, Pinellas County School Board, non-profit groups, and the citizens of Clearwater and Pinellas County. Funding ultimately depends on the support and wishes of the people, whether it is for an additional 10 years of "Penny for Pinellas", a 30 million dollar municipal bond issue, additional State and Federal grants, new impact fees or county funding. It is up to each one of us.
