




## Economic Development Survey

## INTRODUCTION

ICMA's Survey Research Team has collected information on the economic development priorities, practices, and challenges of local governments for several decades. The ICMA Economic Development Survey is a national survey of U.S. counties and municipalities, conducted every five years. The most recent iteration was launched in 2014.

## IMPACT OF SKILLED LABOR ON LOCAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- Lack of skilled labor is a growing concern among U.S. local governments. Among various factors identified as the most important barriers to local economic development, lack of skilled labor has been steadily increasing in rank.
- In 2014, 85.3% of communities responding to ICMA's
  Economic Development Survey identified a
  lack of skilled labor as an important barrier to economic development, with 46.5% of respondents indicating either medium or high importance in their communities.
- Regional differences in responses were not particularly large, though communities in the New England and Mid-Atlantic regions generally reported lack of skilled labor as having less importance in impeding economic development.
